Nunavut Position:

EMMC 2015 was divided into five sessions: Innovation, Public Confidence, Energy, Mines, and Industry & Regulatory Reform. Each session produced its own decisions and deliverables.

1. Open Joint Session: Innovation

Session opened by highlighting the findings of *Innovating for a Strong Canadian Energy and Mining Sector*, a report which had been developed with input from Provinces and Territories. The report presents an overview of the current state of innovation in Canada's energy and minerals and metals sectors. It is organized into three key observations: Canada's natural resource advantage, Canada's innovation leadership in the energy and mining sectors, and the future importance of innovation.

Decision:

• Ministers agreed to the public release of the report: *Innovating for a Strong Canadian Energy and Mining Sector.*

2. <u>Closed Joint Session: Public Confidence</u>

Ministers heard a presentation from Dr. Monica Gattinger, a professor at the University of Ottawa. Dr. Gattinger framed the issue of public confidence through four areas of focus:

- Mining/energy literacy and public opinion

- Environmental groups and local communities
- Aboriginal participation in resource development
- Intergovernmental relations

Decision:

• Ministers agreed to continue to explore ways for FTP collaboration in the area of public confidence and continue this work into EMMC 2016.

3. Closed Energy Ministers Session

Ministers were briefed on the progress of several working groups, which included information on US/Canada electricity reliability, industrial energy efficiency, shale and tight resources, and pipeline/rail/tanker safety standards.

Decision:

Ministers agreed to the public release of a number of reports:

- After the Blackout, Implementation of Mandatory Electric Reliability Standards in Canada
- Regulatory Side-by-Side Governing Permitting of Cross-Border Electricity Transmission Facilities
- Maximizing Canada's Industrial Energy Efficiency
- Taking Action: Moving forward together on energy research, technology and innovation.
- Ministers also approved web content for a Shale and Tight Resources web portal, and well as fact sheets on pipeline/marine/rail safety.

Ministers also agreed to fully implement the *Pipeline Safety Act*, while continuing to implement tangible measures that improve energy transportation by pipeline, marine, and rail. Ministers made a number of other agreements, including:

- Work with other jurisdictions to maintain Canadian progress in the clean-energy market
- Participate when needed in the North American Energy Ministers' Working Group on Energy and Climate Change
- Continued participation in the EMMC Energy Technology Working Group and its multi-year work plan on shale resource development and distributed power generation.

• Working together to provide and promote evidence-based public awareness on the development of unconventional petroleum resources.

4. Closed Mines Ministers Session

Mines ministers discussed current opportunities and challenges facing the mining sector, emphasizing the importance support for junior mining companies, the importance of community engagement, and ongoing innovation in the mining sector.

Decision:

- Ministers released four new case studies to be added to the 2014 report Compendium of Good Practices in Community Engagement and Readiness. The four new case studies from Saskatchewan, Quebec, Manitoba, and Yukon show how early and sustained engagement is critical through each stage of mineral development.
- Ministers recognized the importance of innovation in the mining industry by continuing to support the federal government's Green Mining Initiative. To this end, the Government of Canada recently invested \$23 million over 5 years to stimulate technological innovation in the development of rare earth metals and chromite.
- British Columbia presented on the Mount Polley incident and subsequent recommendations. Ministers agreed to the importance of strong mine regulations to ensure that industry standards reflect the highest level of environmental protection.
- The National Orphaned/Abandoned Mines Initiative's (NOAMI) work in mine site remediation, and the importance of continuing that work was also discussed.

5. Close Joint Session: Industry and Regulatory Reform

The last session of the conference saw a presentation from industry representatives on the future on energy and mining in Canada, updates from the Regulatory Reform working group, and updates on the Major Projects Management Office.

Decision:

- Ministers endorsed the findings from the Regulatory Reform Working Group Final Report, most notably the proposal to dissolve the group.
- Ministers agreed to enhance engagement with Aboriginal communities through the Major Projects Management Office. An updated version of the Major Projects Inventory was also provided.

Ministers accepted an invitation from Manitoba to convene in Winnipeg from August 21 to August 23, for the 2016 Energy and Mines Ministers' Conference.

As a starting point, the issue of public confidence has been identified as a possible area that could guide the 2016 work.

Federal, Provincial and Territorial Ministers Responsible for Energy and Mines Highlight Priorities for Upcoming Year

July 21, 2015 Halifax Natural Resources Canada

The federal, provincial, and territorial ministers responsible for energy and mines today announced significant progress supporting enhanced economic growth, energy security, innovation, Aboriginal engagement and environmental protection and performance with the objective of further increasing the environmentally responsible development of natural resources across our country.

The ministers affirmed the critical importance of principles consistent with recent annual meetings:

- Responsible development of Canada's energy and mines sectors is critical to our economic competitiveness, job creation and long-term prosperity;
- The continued advancement of energy infrastructure projects (including oil, gas, and electricity) is fundamental to gaining access to new markets, generating economic growth and revenue for critical social programs;
- Continued diversification of Canada's energy sources and markets contributes to domestic and global energy security;
- Recent successes implementing innovative technologies and policies dealing with carbon and enhancing Canada's leadership as an environmentally responsible global resource producer and supplier;
- Effective cooperation between governments, regulators and industry is essential to continued improvements to build on Canada's world class record of safe energy transportation and transmission;
- Effective engagement is essential for advancing the objective of ensuring that Aboriginal people fully benefit from the responsible development of natural resources; and

• The junior mining and resource sector is a major contributor to Canada's competitiveness and global expertise, and the importance of access to capital in the discovery and development of the next generation of resource projects is recognized.

In particular, following this week's meeting, the ministers emphasized the need over the coming year to:

- Fully implement the federal *Pipeline Safety Act* that received Royal Assent in June 2015 and continue consistent action by all governments within their respective jurisdiction resulting in tangible measures that improve safety by pipeline, marine and rail;
- Explore and encourage innovative technologies to help Canadian natural resource industries address productivity challenges and environmental performance;
- Ensure that standards for industry reflect the highest level of environmental protection. This includes the review of recommendations made subsequent to the Mount Polley incident in British Columbia to determine how all jurisdictions can strengthen mine regulations;
- Continue to advance the National Orphaned/Abandoned Mines Initiative, a multistakeholder forum that provides a platform for sharing experiences and best practices in mine site remediation;
- Work within our respective jurisdictions to maintain the momentum that has contributed to Canada's becoming the second-fastest growing clean energy market in the G20 and possessing the highest share of renewables in its electricity mix in the G7;
- Enhance North American cooperation to protect Canada's competiveness while supporting jobs, the economy and the environment, including through the North American Energy Ministers' Working Group on Energy and Climate Change established in May 2015;
- Enhance engagement with Aboriginal communities through mechanisms like the Major Projects Management Office - West — and other effective means — to share information, identify common interests and facilitate their participation in natural resources;
- Increase federal-provincial-territorial cooperation on highlighting Canada as a secure, reliable and responsible producer and supplier of energy and minerals. This will effectively build on milestones over the past year including leadership on the European Union Fuel Quality Directive and mandatory reporting legislation;

- Work together in the interests of enhancing Canada's contribution to global energy security at home and abroad. According to Statistics Canada, between 2005 and 2014, Canada's crude oil imports declined by 42 percent while our exports have increased by 81 percent. Projects such as LNG and hydro proposals will continue this important momentum;
- Help Canadian energy and mining sectors address environmental performance through the advancement and deployment of research, technology and innovation;
- Ministers agreed to work together on initiatives to provide and promote evidencebased public awareness on the development of unconventional petroleum resources; and
- Collaborate on responsible energy use, which provides cost savings to consumers and industry as well as contributing to meeting environmental objectives.

Together, these actions will provide Canadians with increased economic opportunities while protecting their safety, security and environment, build Canada's competitive advantage in a rapidly changing global marketplace, and improve living standards for Canadians.

Federal, provincial and territorial governments are committed to taking collective actions to promote Canada's role as a secure supplier of natural resources globally and to ensure long-term economic stability and prosperity for all Canadians.

The next Energy and Mines Ministers' Conference will take place from August 21 to August 23, 2016, in Winnipeg, Manitoba.
