This report highlights some of the exciting initiatives made possible by dedicated volunteers and community leaders in 2019–20.

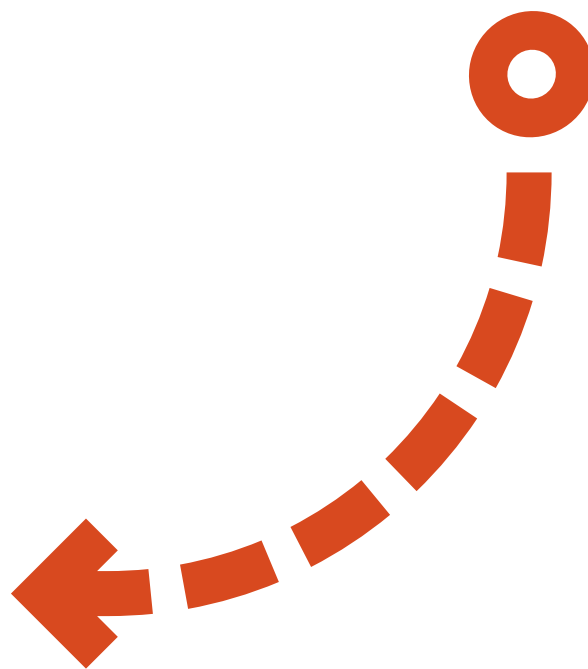

This Sport and Recreation Division 2019–20 Impact Report shows how the funding administered through the new Policy was distributed and the positive outcomes of these investments.

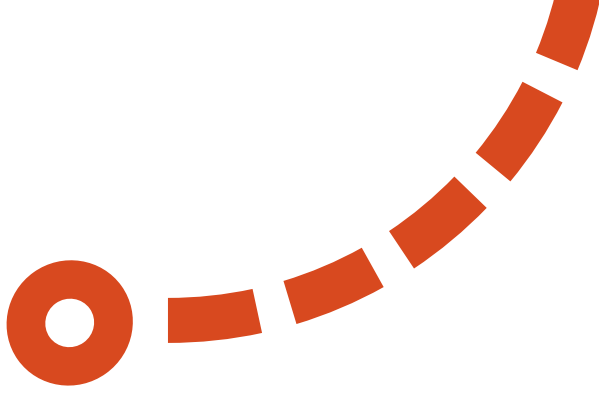

Sport and Recreation Division

Overview

The Sport and Recreation Division is responsible for the promotion, development, and delivery of sport, physical activity, and recreation opportunities for all Nunavummiut.



Fulfilling this mandate is a team effort!

The Sport and Recreation Division works together with municipalities and non-profit organizations in Nunavut that provide sport, physical activity, and recreation programs and services.

As part of the Department of Community and Government Services, the Sport and Recreation Division works on completing priorities outlined in the Government of Nunavut & Territorial Corporations Business Plan and playing its part in fulfilling the Government of Nunavut's Turaaqtavut vision.

The Sport and Recreation Division is also a member of a national team made up of Sport, Physical Activity, and Recreation branches from the other provincial and territorial governments and the federal government. These groups team up to set national priorities, which are outlined in guiding documents like the Canadian Sport Policy, A Framework for Recreation in Canada, and A Common Vision for Increasing Physical Activity and Decreasing Sedentary Behaviour in Canada.





Sport and Recreation Grants and Contributions Program

Overview

One strategy that the Sport and Recreation Division uses to fulfill its mandate is the Grants and Contributions Program, which is governed by the Sport and Recreation Grants and Contributions Policy 2019–2023.

Through the Policy, the Division provides financial support to municipalities and non-profit organizations to plan and deliver sport, physical activity, and recreation programs and initiatives that align with the goals and priorities of the Department of Community and Government Services, the Government of Nunavut, and the Canadian Sport, Physical Activity, and Recreation sector.

Team Nunavut Major Games Program





Overview

The Team Nunavut Major Games Program is one of the Government of Nunavut's most visible and well-known programs and it is delivered by the Sport and Recreation Division.

There are two components to the Team Nunavut Major Games Program:

Team Nunavut

Team Nunavut competes in five major games: Arctic Winter Games, Canada Summer Games, Canada Winter Games, North American Indigenous Games, and Western Canada Summer Games. These major games occur on a two- to four-year cycle.

Team Nunavut is made up of athletes, coaches, managers, mission staff, and Youth Ambassadors. For the Arctic Winter Games, Team Nunavut also includes a cultural delegation.

Nunavut Youth Ambassador Program

The Nunavut Youth Ambassador Program uses the power of sport to promote leadership development and community engagement for youth across the territory.

Youth Ambassadors participate in training sessions throughout the year to prepare them to plan and lead sport and recreation initiatives in their respective communities. Additionally, Youth Ambassadors are encouraged to engage in other volunteer opportunities, including volunteering at major games that Team Nunavut attends.

2019 Western Canada
Summer Games



2020 Arctic Winter Games

Team Nunavut experienced some great successes at the Western Canada Summer Games but unfortunately the Arctic Winter Games were cancelled due to COVID-19.





Eligibility

Each of the major games is different in terms of purpose, participating jurisdictions, sports offered, age categories, and athlete eligibility criteria.

The Western Canada Summer Games provides development opportunities for young Canadian athletes from three western provinces (Alberta, Manitoba, and Saskatchewan) and the three territories (Northwest Territories, Nunavut, and

Yukon). The 2019 Games featured over 1,700 participants from 16 sports.

The Arctic Winter Games is an international event for northern and Arctic athletes. The mission of the Games is to promote athletic competition, cultural exhibition, and social interaction among Northerners. In 2020, 2,000 participants from nine circumpolar contingents were set to compete in 21 sports.

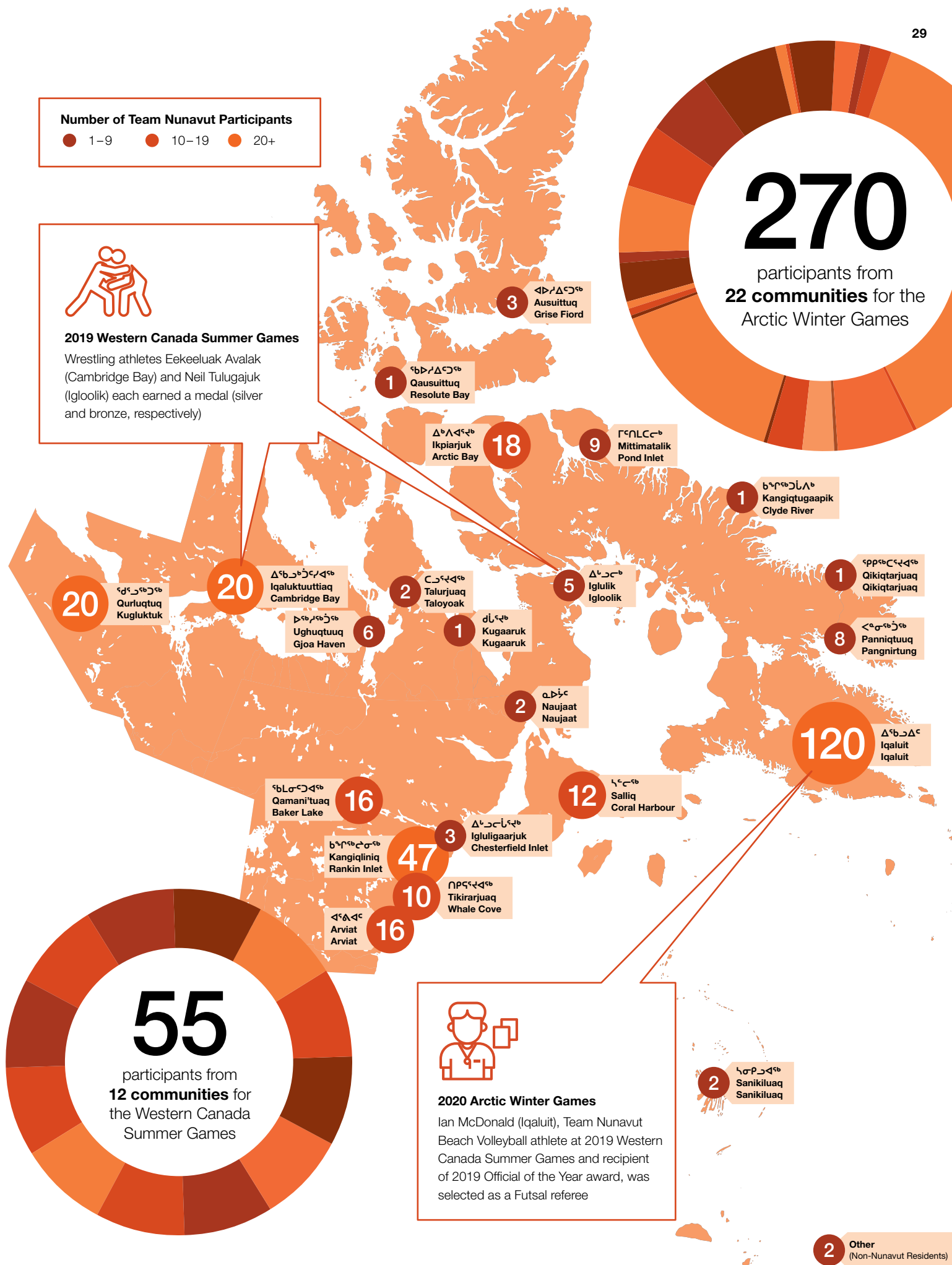
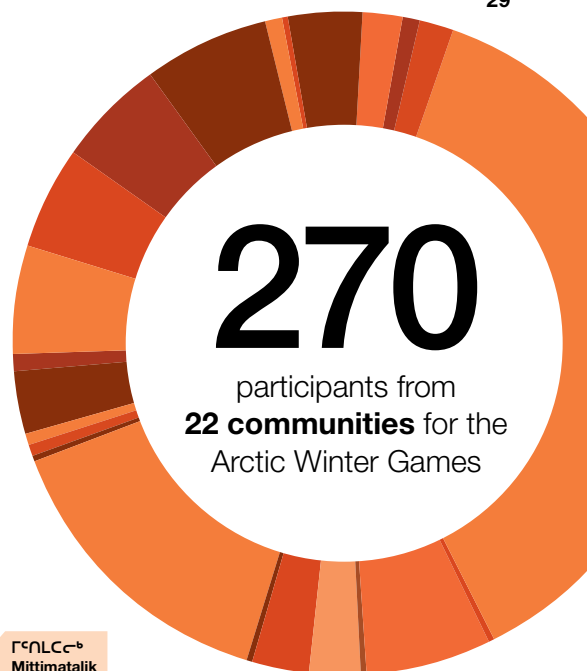
Number of Team Nunavut Participants

Volunteer Opportunities

Four Youth Ambassadors joined Team Nunavut at the 2019 Western Canada Summer Games to volunteer for the Host Society.

Ten Youth Ambassadors were slated to represent Nunavut as volunteers at the 2020 Arctic Winter Games before it was cancelled due to COVID-19.

A small contingent of three Nunavut Youth Ambassadors was going to serve as youth delegates at the Federal-Provincial/Territorial (F-P/T) Ministers' Sport, Physical Activity, and Recreation (SPAR) Conference scheduled to take place in Whitehorse prior to the Arctic Winter Games. This Conference was also cancelled due to COVID-19.

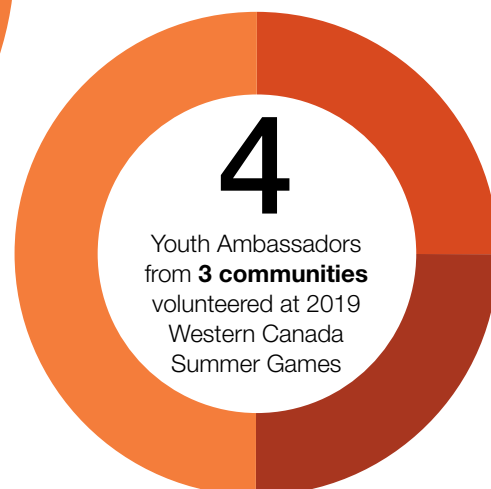
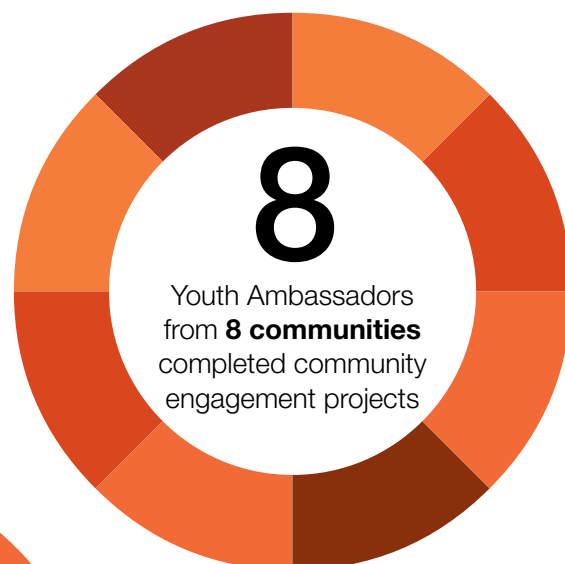

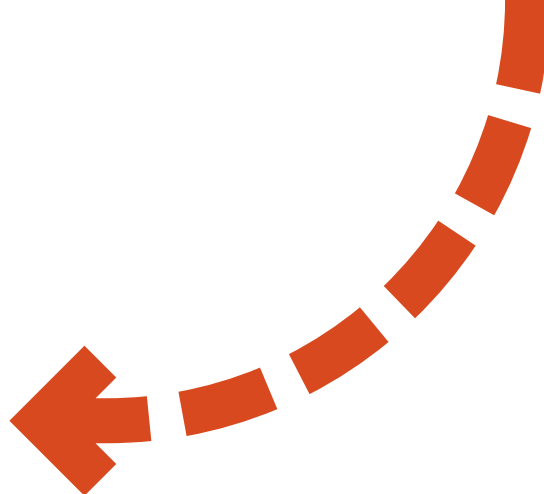
